- 1 counteract the negative effects of the less healthy
- 2 selections.
- 3 EBONEE: Is he speaking English?
- 4 NADIA: Come on, guys, we're never gonna get this done.
- 5 TAYLOR: And then the teacher will plan the whole thing for
- 6 us
- 7 ZECHARIAH: (Inspired) That was my plan from the start! We
- 8 could have saved all this trouble!
- 9 BLAIR: Trouble? You think planning a party is trouble?
- 10 BEN: With you guys it is.
- 11 EBONEE: All this talking about food is making me hungry.
- 12 BEN: Is it lunchtime?
- 13 MILAN: There are still twelve minutes and forty-one seconds
- 14 left before lunch.
- 15 TAYLOR: We didn't even talk about decorations yet.
- 16 BEN: This is really sounding like a girly party.
- 17 BLAIR: Why? Because we want decorations?
- 18 NADIA: I give up.
- 19 ZECHARIAH: You all wake me up when you've decided what
- you're doing. (Closes his eyes and leans back.)
- 21 BEN: Yeah, me too.
- 22 BLAIR: (Suddenly bored) This party does sound pretty lame.
- 23 TAYLOR: Of course it does! We haven't decided on one thing
- 24 yet!
- 25 NADIA: Come on, Taylor, let's do it ourselves.
- 26 BLAIR: Wait a minute! What about Ebonee and me?
- 27 TAYLOR: (Sadly) Looks like girls outnumber boys again.
- 28 BEN: (Satisfied) Just the way I planned it.
- 29 ZECHARIAH: Yeah. Let the girls and Taylor do the work. We
- 30 can show up that will be our part. (Everyone exits
- 31 except MILAN.)
- 32 MILAN: Sometimes when dealing with inferior personalities,
- it doesn't pay to be too logical.

## 26. Do You Believe?

Topic: Twelve-year-olds discuss the age-old mystery of Santa Claus.

## Cast:

RONI: a little hard-edged, worldly

TERRY: old for her age, world-wise

LONI: the last kid her age to learn the "truth"

- 1 (Scene begins as ACTORS are sitting around on a sofa, or playing video games.)
- RONI: Hey, Terry, what are your parents getting you for Christmas?
- 5 TERRY: I asked for a computer and TV for my room. I'll probably get clothes and junk I didn't ask for.
- 7 LONI: (Sincerely) What about Santa Claus?
- 8 TERRY: (Clearly not having heard correctly) Huh?
- 9 LONI: Well, did you ask Santa Claus for anything?
- 10 RONI: (A little concerned) Are you feeling OK, Loni?
- 11 LONI: Sure. Why?
- 12 RONI: Did you say "ask Santa Claus"?
- 13 LONI: Yes, of course.
- 14 TERRY: (Suspiciously) Did you ask Santa Claus for anything,
- 15 Loni?
- $16\,$  LONI: Absolutely. I always ask for things and I get what I
- want. Within reason, of course.
- 18 TERRY: (Beginning to become worried about her friend) Let me
- 19 get this straight. You actually go to the mall and sit on
- that guy with the beard's lap and read from your goody
- 21 list?
- 22 LONI: Of course not.
- 23 RONI: Thank heavens.
- 24 LONI: (Reasonably) I write him a letter.
- 25 TERRY: (Appalled) You've got to be kidding.

- 1 LONI: Every year on Thanksgiving night I sit down and write
- 2 a very polite and grateful letter to Santa Claus. I've done
- 3 it since I was little and it works perfectly.
- 4 RONI: (Very sincerely concerned) Loni, please tell me you're
- 5 kidding. Please tell me you don't believe in Santa Claus.
- 6 LONI: Of course I believe in him. Don't you?
- 7 TERRY: Uh, no.
- 8 LONI: Roni?
- 9 RONI: I can't believe you're even asking.
- 10 LONI: (A little saddened by her friends) When did you become
- 11 disillusioned, Terry?
- 12 TERRY: What?
- 13 LONI: When did you stop believing?
- 14 TERRY: When I was like five. I saw my mom sticking the
- 15 gifts under the tree late at night.
- 16 LONI: And you, Roni?
- 17 RONI: I actually saw my dad eat half a cookie on Santa's
- plate and put crumbs on the plate so it looked authentic.
- 19 I was seven.
- 20 LONI: (Like a lawyer presenting evidence) So, because of that
- 21 circumstantial evidence, you gave up believing in Santa
- 22 Claus?
- 23 TERRY: Come on, Loni, everyone knows there's no such
- 24 person.
- 25 LONI: Not everyone. I believe in him.
- 26 RONI: (Exasperated) I can't believe we're even having this
- 27 conversation.
- 28 LONI: Did you ever ask your parents about it?
- 29 TERRY: Sure, and they told me I was right. You need to take
- 30 a little reality trip, Loni, and grow up a little.
- 31 RONI: Yeah, it must be embarrassing to go around saying
- 32 things like that. I wouldn't tell the kids at school if I were
- 33 you. They'll tease you to death.
- 34 LONI: (Slyly) What if I'm right?
- 35 TERRY: You're not.

- I LONI: (Insisting) What if I am?
- RONI: Loni, we're trying to tell you there's no such thing as
- Santa. How did you get to be twelve without finding that out?
- 5 LONI: (Persistent and emphatic) What if you're wrong?
- 6 RONI: Huh?
- 7 LONI: What if there is a Santa and, because you say he
- 8 doesn't exist, he doesn't come to your house?
- TERRY: That's impossible.
- 10 LONI: Why? Didn't you get more presents when you believed
  - in him?

- 12 RONI: No. Not possible. I didn't ... (Pauses and thinks a
- 13 minute) well, it just seemed like I got more presents
- because I was little. When you're five, a box of crayons
- is a big deal. My mom could wrap up underwear and I
- thought it was cool. She can't get away with that any
- 17 more.
- 18 LONI: Maybe you did get more presents.
- 19 TERRY: Only because kid toys cost like ten dollars and the
- 20 sweatshirt I want costs forty-eight dollars. We get less
- 21 now because our gifts are more expensive.
- 22 LONI: Maybe so. Maybe not.
- 23 RONI: You're going to try to keep on believing, in spite of
- 24 what we've told you and what everyone in the world
- 25 says?
- 26 LONI: Not everyone. There are lots of people who believe.
- 27 The spirit of Christmas is about faith and hope and
- 28 believing in something bigger than yourself. Maybe
- everybody, even adults, would be happier if they believed
- 30 in a little magic.
- 31 TERRY: I can just see my dad sitting with a beer waiting up
- 32 all night for Santa to arrive and bring him that electric
- 33 drill my mom won't get him.
- 34 LONI: Maybe he'll get it this year.
- 35 TERRY: Maybe I should get it for him.

- 1 RONI: It would be fun to play Santa, though. To buy a couple
- of things for my sisters and put them under the tree with
- 3 Santa on the tag and not tell them who it's from.
- 4 LONI: I see Santa is going to show up at your house this year.
- 6 TERRY: I still think you're crazy, Loni, but it does sound like
- fun.
- 8 LONI: Isn't that what it's all about?

## 27. How May I Help You?

**Topic:** Communication problems via the phone between an innocent citizen and corporate America.

## Cast:

REP: almost mechanical, working on automatic pilot with not much emotion

CUSTOMER: trying painfully to bring a little logic to the conversation

- (This scene should take place with both ACTORS On-Stage.
- 2 Customer REP should be sitting at a desk with a headset to
- 3 serve as the phone and something to serve as a computer.
- CUSTOMER should have a cell or regular phone. They should
- be on opposite sides of the stage and never make eye
- contact.)

- REP: (Very rehearsed, professional, falsely cheerful) Hello, this is
  - National Credit Agency. How may I help you?
- 9 CUSTOMER: Hi. I'm calling to let you know my grandmother
- 10 has passed away and to cancel her account.
- 11 REP: OK. Could I please get the account number?
- 12 CUSTOMER: (Consulting a paper) Yes, that's five-six-nine-
- 13 one-two-five-four-six-seven.
- 14 REP: Thank you. (Clicks some keys on the computer. Consults
- 15 screen.) Yes, I see the account here. There is a three
- 16 hundred dollar balance.
- 17 CUSTOMER: Well, she died three months ago, in
- September, and there was a zero dollar balance at that
- 19 time.
- 20 REP: Well, these charges are for annual fees and late
- 21 charges. There are also some penalties added for
- 22 October and November.
- 23 CUSTOMER: I just told you that she died in September.
- REP: I understand, but she is still responsible for the late
- 25 charges and the fees.
