5	CASEY: I can't believe all this hard work was for nothing!
6	LESLEY: (Jumps up.) Maybe not — remember, one day we'll be
7	seniors! (They all groan and exit, leaving LESLEY On-stage by
8	herself.)
9	LESLEY: Hey, guys! Wait up! Come on! Don't be like this It'll
10	be great!

K-I-S-S-I-N-G

(2 Girls)

CHARACTERS:

Mattie: Middle-school-aged sister with lots of questions about boys.

Mary: High-school-aged sister, more sophisticated, seems to have all the answers when it comes to boys.

SETTING:

The two sisters are camping out. At first, they're spying on their parents who are outside by the fire. Then they get caught up in their own conversation about kissing.

- 1 MATTIE: Mary. (Nudges MARY.) You awake?
- 2 MARY: (Sits up on elbows.) Yeah, I can't believe we're supposed
- 3 to sleep on the ground. When Mom and Dad said "a
- 4 weekend away," I thought they meant in a hotel. Tent
- 5 camping stinks.
- 6 MATTIE: Really. I can feel every little pebble poking my back.
- 7 MARY: Like "The Princess and the Pea"? I guess that makes
- 8 Mom the wicked queen. Wait until I tell her ... Mom ...
- 9 MATTIE: (Puts her hand over MARY's mouth.) Shhhh! They'll hear
- 10 you. And they don't want to be disturbed. Remember?
- 11 MARY: I remember. Why else would I be stuck in a tent with you
- when it's only ten o'clock? At home I wouldn't be in bed for
- 13 another three hours!
- 14 MATTIE: (Points out toward "parents.") What do you suppose
- 15 they're talking about?
- 16 MARY: Who knows? Mom said the counselor told them they
- 17 need to spend some quality time together. To "reconnect."
- I don't know why they had to come here to do that
- 19 Couldn't they "reconnect" at home?
- 20 MATTIE: Really. Better yet. They could've come camping
- 21 without us.
- 22 MARY: I know. I'm perfectly capable of baby-sitting you for a
- 23 weekend. Only Mom thinks I'd throw a wild party or
- something.
- 25 MATTIE: Well, you did throw a party the last time they left us
- 26 alone for the night.
- 27 MARY: Don't remind me. I'll be paying for that mistake for the
- 28 rest of my life. I think Mom yelled at me for three days
- 29 straight.
- 30 MATTIE: (Looking back out at parents.) At least they're not
- 31 fighting.
- 32 MARY: Oh, no. They've been nice and lovey with each other all
- 33 day. Like they're on a second honeymoon or something.
- Pretty soon, they'll be kissing and hugging like a couple of
- 35 teenagers.

- MATTIE: Oh, gross! Why would they want to do that?
- MARY: 'Cause when you love someone, that's what you do.
- MATTIE: I know that. But not parents! They're not supposed to make out. Especially not with us around.
- MARY: Sorry, chicklet. Fact of life. Besides, why do you think they made us go to bed so early?
- MATTIE: It's not like they were paying any attention to us anyway.
- MARY: I guess it's better to see them kissing all the time than fighting.
- MATTIE: I don't know ... I think I still prefer the fighting.

 (Scrunches face in disgust.) Have you ever kissed a boy before?
- MARY: Kind of. Last year, Chris Morton gave me a kiss and I kissed him back but it wasn't a real kiss.
- MATTIE: What do you mean a *real* kiss? Did you really kiss him or not?
- 18 MARY: There's a difference in how you kiss Mom and Dad and 19 how you kiss someone you love, and even then, it's not 20 always a real kiss.
- MATTIE: Duh. I am in middle school. I know the difference between kissing a relative and kissing a boy. But how do you "not really" kiss a boy?
- MARY: No chemistry.
- MATTIE: You've got to have chemistry for it to count?
- MARY: Yeah. Your lips should tingle and you should get all light-headed and stuff. Otherwise like kissing a relative.
- MATTIE: Huh. There's this girl in eighth grade that missed her bus because this boy kissed her and then she forgot her bus number. Her mom had to come get her. Do you think that was a real kiss?
- MARY: I'd say a kiss that makes you forget your bus number is definitely a real kiss.
- MATTIE: Even though it was only on her cheek?
- MARY: (Laughs.) That guy must pack a powerful kiss if he

- only had to kiss her on the cheek to give her temporary amnesia.
- 3 MATTIE: So you didn't forget anything after you kissed Christ
- 4 MARY: Nope. Not a thing. Though I would've liked to have
- 5 forgotten that I actually kissed him.
- 6 MATTIE: And your lips didn't tingle even a little bit?
- 7 MARY: Nope. It was like kissing our brother ... if we had one
- 8 (Looks out at parents.) Let's hope the counselor didn't
- 9 suggest that as part of therapy. The last thing we need in
- 10 a brother ... or sister.
- 11 MATTIE: Really.
- 12 MARY: (Nudges MATTIE.) It's bad enough having one pesky little
- 13 sister.
- 14 MATTIE: Funny. If I wasn't here, who would you boss around?
- 15 MARY: Good point.
- 16 MATTIE: (Girls are quiet for a minute.) Would you teach me how to
- 17 kiss?
- 18 MARY: Gross!
- 19 MATTIE: I don't mean kiss me, just tell me how.
- 20 MARY: Why? You got a boy in mind?
- 21 MATTIE: Not really. But I am getting older. It's going to happen
- 22 some day, you know.
- 23 MARY: Not if you keep eating those nasty onion rings! No boy
- 24 will come within ten feet of you.
- 25 MATTIE: I know. That's my boy repellent for now. When I stop
- 26 eating them watch out! Boys will be running to come
- 27 kiss me!
- 28 MARY: Yeah, I'm sure they'll be knocking each other over just
- 29 to get a kiss from you.
- 30 MATTIE: Could happen. So what do I do? I need to be prepared
- 31 right?
- 32 MARY: Well, first you want to make sure that you do have
- 33 breath that won't kill a dog. So, if you think you're going
- 34 to be in a situation where it could actually happen you
- 35 know, in about ten million years or so —

- MATTIE: You're so funny for a girl who probably doesn't even know how to kiss —
- MARY: Oh, I know how! Believe me!
- MATTIE: So you say.
- MARY: Look, do you want my help or not?
- MATTIE: OK. So fresh breath. I get it. I'll be sure to carry a whole purse full of breath mints.
- MARY: That's a start. The next step is to make sure you look kissable.
- MATTIE: Look kissable? How do you look kissable?
- II MARY: Well, you don't want boogers in your nose ...
- MATTIE: Duh.
- MARY: Or gross chapped lips. You know how you sometimes have those little pieces of skin hanging off your lips ... well, you definitely don't want any of those.
- 16 MATTIE: Got it. Use lots of lip balm.
- MARY: The next step is to let the boy know you want to kiss him.
- 19 MATTIE: Like in a note?
- MARY: Omigosh. No. Not in a note. With your body language.
- MATTIE: How do I do that?
- MARY: You don't move away if he starts standing real close to you.
- MATTIE: Mrs. Arrowwood calls that our "personal space." She gets real mad if she sees us getting too close to each
- gets real mad if she sees us getting too close to each other. But that's because she's afraid of lice. One year her
- whole class got them! She was so paranoid about getting
- them that she cut her hair so short she looked like a man!
- Too bad for her that she got them anyway! Ever since, she has *strict* rules about personal space
- has *strict* rules about personal space.
- MARY: Well, then you won't want to be kissing in her room.

 MATTIE: Oh no! I would never! She'd suspend me for weeks! So
- what's the next step?
- MARY: We're still on the last one. You can't just let him in your
- personal space to give him a clue that you want to kiss

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- 1 him. Boys are dense. It takes a whole lot more than that
- 2 MATTIE: Like what? A sign? Poster? Billboard? Flashing neon
- 3 lights?
- 4 MARY: Just about. You have to be flirty. You know, twist your
- 5 hair around your finger, laugh at everything he says but
- 6 not too loud or you'll scare him off ...
- 7 MATTIE: This all sounds pretty complicated.
- 8 MARY: It is. You don't want to mess up and be known as the
- 9 worst kisser in school.
- 10 MATTIE: I can definitely say that I don't want to be known for
- 11 that. So what else?
- 12 MARY: When he moves in for the kiss, you'll need to be ready
- 13 You have to move just right or you'll bump heads.
- 14 MATTIE: That would be bad.
- 15 MARY: Real bad. And you have to make sure he's actually coming
- in to kiss you and not just leaning in to tell you something
- or you'll look like an idiot if you start puckering up!
- 18 MATTIE: OK, so no puckering until I'm absolutely sure.
- 19 MARY: Once his lips are on yours, you'll need to exert the right
- 20 amount of pressure.
- 21 MATTIE: Right amount of pressure? Are we talking about lips or
- 22 tires here?
- 23 MARY: Believe me, you do not want to be to loose and fishy, and
- you definitely do not want to be too hard. You have to be
- 25 soft but not too soft. Firm but not too firm.
- 26 MATTIE: (Giggling) Sounds like kissing for Goldilocks
- 27 Everything has to be "just right."
- 28 MARY: Pretty much.
- 29 MATTIE: So how will I know what's "just right"?
- 30 MARY: Practice. I saw a movie once where a girl practiced
- 31 kissing on her arm. You could do that. You'll be able to tell
- 32 if you pressing too hard or too soft.
- 33 MATTIE: OK. (Kisses arm very quickly.)
- 34 MARY: You have to do it longer than that. A real kiss takes
- 35 time.

- MATTIE: OK, OK. (Kisses arm again, slower.)
- MARY: Good. Now, close your eyes.
- MATTIE: Why? What are you going to do to me?
- MARY: I'm not going to do anything.
- MATTIE: Promise?
- MARY: I promise.
- MATTIE: Pinkie swear?
- MARY: Fine. Pinkie swear. (They hook pinkies.) Now try it again
- and close your eyes. You can't stare the boy down. It'll
- make him nervous. Besides, it's more romantic if your eyes
- are shut.

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- MATTIE: But if we both close our eyes, how are we going to find
- each other's lips?
- 14 MARY: (Sighing) You have to time it just right. As he's moving
- in for the kiss, you keep your eyes open. When your lips
 - meet, you close your eyes.
- 17 MATTIE: Got it. (Closes eyes and starts toward her arm. Stops and
- opens her eyes again.) But when do you open them again?
- 19 MARY: (Sarcastically) After you've graduated high school.
- (Nudges her.) When the kiss is over, dummy. You don't want
- to stand there with your eyes closed forever. He'll think
- he's put you in a coma or something.
- 23 MATTIE: The second it's over, or wait a minute?
- 24 MARY: As soon as he moves away, you open your eyes.
- 25 MATTIE: What about peeking? Should I peek to see what's
 - going on?
- 27 MARY: No! You definitely do not peek. He'll think you're bored
- or something.
- 29 MATTIE: How would he know unless he's peeking, too?
- 10 MARY: Just don't peek, OK?
- 31 MATTIE: Fine. So that's it? Everything I need to know about
- 32 kissing?
- 33 MARY: Pretty much.
- 34 MATTIE: OK. I think I've got it: Fresh breath, look klasable, let
- 35 him in my personal space, use the right amount of

- 1 pressure, and close my eyes.
- 2 MARY: You're all set. For now. But you might want to go ahead
- 3 and get that first kiss over with before next week ...
- 4 MATTIE: Before next week? Why?
- 5 MARY: You get your braces then, right?
- 6 MATTIE: Yeah. What does that have to do with kissing?
- 7 MARY: (Dramatically) Having braces changes everything!
- 8 MATTIE: (Obviously panicked) It does? Oh no! Why? What do I
- 9 need to know?
- 10 MARY: (Shaking her head and smiling) Just practice your arm
- 11 kissing, OK, Mattie?

Dance Fever

(2 Girls, 2 Guys)

CHARACTERS:

Paige: Confident girl who thinks she knows everything about guys.

Misty: Shy girl who is completely clueless when it comes to guys. She believes everything Paige tells her about the ins and outs of getting a boy to dance.

Stephen: Guy who thinks he knows everything about girls.

Cory: Very nervous guy who is terrified of dancing with a girl. Takes advice from his friend Stephen who convinces him that he knows everything about girls.

SETTING:

School dance. The two girls stand on one side of the stage having one conversation, while the two guys stand on the other side having their own conversation. The skit will alternate sides: while one side is talking, the other side freezes, and vice versa.
