41. The Intimidation

(In an office. #1 is finishing up some work at his/her desk. #2 peeks his/her head in the door.)

- #2: I've also got some reports of my own I should get done today. I'll talk to you later. (Starts to exit.)
- #1: Whoa, hold on! Come in here.
- #2: I really have a lot of work...
- #1: Yeah, so you've said. Just get in here and close the door.

 (#2 comes all the way in and closes the door.) Sit down.

 (#2 pauses, then walks over to the chair by the desk and sits down.) So, you want to tell me about it?
- #2: About what?
- #1: I don't know, you tell me, but something's wrong.
- #2: There's nothing to tell.
- #1: Look Nancy/Nathan, I know you. You've barely said two words to anyone in the last week, and you've been disappearing right after work. So, again, what's up!?
- #2: And I'll tell you again, nothing! OK? May I go now?
- #1: (Pause) Fine. Whatever. Sorry I bothered you.

- #2: (Starts to leave then stops. He/She keeps his/her back to #1.)
 Look, if I do tell you, will you promise me it won't leave
 this room?
- #1: Do you really need to ask?
- #2: (Turns and goes back to the chair and sits down.) OK...I...
 God, this is difficult.
- #1: Just say it.
- #2: (Pause) I'm being...bothered.
- #1: (Pause) What do you mean, "bothered"?
- #2: Intimidated.
- #1: How?
- #2: (Pause) Verbally.
 (There is silence.)
- #1: Are you going to tell me who it is and what's going on?
- #2: I can, but it could put you in an awkward situation.
- #1: You think I really care about that?
- #2: You might.
- #1: Tell me.
- #2: (Pause) Bill Dodd.
- #1: Bill!?
- #2: See, what I mean?
- #1: OK, start at the beginning and tell me everything.
- #2: I guess it started right after I finished my orientation.
 Bill would drop by my office to find out how I was doing.
 Then he would drop "hints" that he didn't want me to have this job. That maybe I wasn't qualified.
- #1: Go on.
- #2: This went on for a few weeks, his visits became a little more frequent and his hints a little more clear.
- #1: How "clear"?
- #2: He said that he was the only one of the executives who voted against me for this job, and he felt I didn't know what I was doing.
- #1: Do you know why he said all this?
- #2: He finally spelled that out this morning. The final

- choices were me and his friend, Eric. He said Eric should be working here and he was going to quietly make sure that I didn't last.
- #1: That's pretty...straightforward... (Pause) Why didn't you come to me with this before?
- #2: Because at first...I though it would stop.
- #1: But today, when it still hadn't, I had to practically brow beat it out of you.
- #2: That's because it's a complicated situation. The man is Vice President. Also you recommended me for this job, and...and how would it look if after just a month I started something like this?
- #1: How would it look? Who cares how it would look. And for your information, I recommended you for this job and you got it because you were the best person qualified. And as far as Bill Dodd goes, what he did is unacceptable.
- #2: But he is your friend.
- #1: So are most people who work here. That doesn't excuse what he did.
- #2: So what do you suggest I do?
- #1: As I see it, you have two choices. One; confront him. Tell him you're going to file a complaint.
- #2: I don't know if I can do that.
- #1: So, you'd rather do nothing?
- #2: No, but it's his word against mine. Who's going to believe me?
- #1: You said it yourself. You just started working here, you really have nothing to gain so why lie?
- #2: What's my other choice? You said I had two.
- #1: You can quit.
- #2: I don't want to quit.
- #1: Then I stand corrected, you only have one choice.
- #2: I could ignore the whole thing.
- #1: You think that'll make him stop? Ignoring is not a choice.
- #2: (Pause) All I wanted to do is work. I was so excited when I

- landed a job here. This really stinks.
- #1: I agree. That's why you owe it to yourself to make sure this guy doesn't get away with it.
- #2: And if I'm responsible for getting someone fired?
- #1: If Bill gets fired, then it's what he deserves. Plus, you're not responsible for his actions. He is!
- #2: I don't know if I can do this by myself.
- #1: You won't have to. I'll go with you.
- #2: But you just said that this is my problem.
- #1: It is, but you don't have to solve it alone. I'm going in there with you.
- #2: Are you sure you want to get involved?
- #1: I'm already involved.
- #2: (Pause) Thank you. (Pause) So when do we do this?
- #1: Well, no time like the present.
- #2: Now?
- #1: Why? Should we wait until he intimidates everyone he doesn't like? Besides, you don't want to go to lunch.
- #2: You know, now that you mention it, I think I'm getting hungry.
- #1: Great, let's have Bill Dodd for lunch. I'm sure you'll find it satisfying.
- #2: I hope so.
 (The two get up and exit.)
