Scene

Honor is the star rower of Masterson Academy crew. Honor is also in love with Ashley Paulson who attends the girls school across the river. Forbidden by his domineering father to see Ashley, Honor has made Ashley a piece of sculpture. He needs Eliot to take it across the river for him. Eliot has been afraid of the water since his father drowned, but must now learn to swim in order to pass gym class and gain favor in the eyes of his secret crush.

Author Note

"—" is an interruption.

"..." is a short pause.

"/" is the point at which the next line of dialogue should begin, creating an overlap in speech.

(ELIOT and HONOR sit in a row boat on a river on the grounds of Masterson Academy Boys School. ELIOT has a blanket over his shoulders.)

HONOR. You look like a grandma.

ELIOT. It's cold.

HONOR. You sound like a grandma.

ELIOT. Well, I'm sorry, but sitting on a river at five in the morning in late October is a very cold thing to do—regardless of one's age. I think I just saw an ice floe.

HONOR. Chill out.

ELIOT. Oh I am chilling—and if I die of hypothermia—

HONOR. What: you'll kill me?

ELIOT. Obviously not, I'll be dead.

HONOR. Fine, you can haunt me. Now stop complaining and take your sweater off. Or should I say my sweater.

ELIOT. Couldn't we do this in the pool?

HONOR. Do you have a master key to the gymnasium?

ELIOT. I think I heard someone.

HONOR. No one is here.

ELIOT. If we wait until the river freezes over, I could just skate across it and give it to her then.

HONOR. That won't happen for weeks, maybe even months.

ELIOT. Absence makes the heart / grow—

HONOR. Anyway, I thought you were Bambi?

ELIOT. I just think-

HONOR. Eliot, you made a promise!

ELIOT. All right!

HONOR. What are you so afraid of?

ELIOT. I'm not afraid.

HONOR. Why are you so afraid of admitting you're afraid?

ELIOT. I am not afraid!

HONOR. How come you never learned to swim?

ELIOT. No reason. I was just-

HONOR. Afraid?

ELIOT. Look, I know the faculty at Masterson thinks otherwise, but a good teacher does not harass his students.

HONOR. You already were anyway.

ELIOT. At least I'm not a liar.

HONOR. 'You trying to make me feel guilty? You won't.

ELIOT. Could you have at least come up with something better than "she fell from a tire swing"?

HONOR. You should have had an older brother. That's what's wrong with you. I had four: they taught me how to swim. And—everything else you don't learn in school.

ELIOT. Well, I didn't, okay? Lucky me: I just get you.

HONOR. If you freak out, don't panic; take a deep breath and hold it. If your lungs are full, you won't be able to sink, it's like having two floats right there inside you.

(Pause.)

Eliot, just trust me, I'm here, nothing bad's going to happen—

ELIOT. ...You do the same, you know?

HONOR. What?

ELIOT. Talk different when you're around me.

HONOR. No I don't.

ELIOT. Yeah you do. When no one else is around, you're / more thoughtful.

HONOR. You should be careful I don't throw you in the river.

ELIOT. I thought that was the point.

HONOR. Shut up... What?

ELIOT. Nothing. I'm "shut up."

HONOR. Do you like being strange?

ELIOT. I don't mind it. I don't find many of our classmates that interesting.

HONOR. Whatever.

ELIOT. What "whatever"?

HONOR. You'd be right there in the thick of it if someone let you in.

ELIOT. Maybe. But no one has, so why sit around whining I'm not.

HONOR. Because you know you want to.

(Pause.)

HONOR. No one. Everyone's asleep.

ELIOT. I heard something.

HONOR. You probably just farted.

ELIOT. No I didn't!

HONOR. I fart when I'm nervous.

ELIOT. I'm not-when are you nervous?

HONOR. I get nervous.

ELIOT. No you don't.

HONOR. Sometimes. / Sometimes I do.

ELIOT. When? I don't believe you.
